

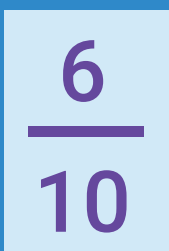

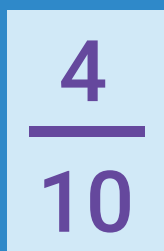
How do students *really* feel about your feedback?

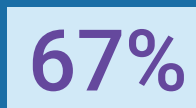
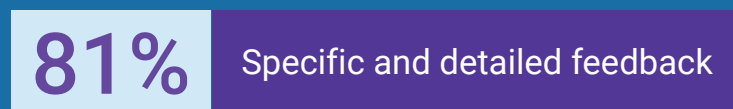
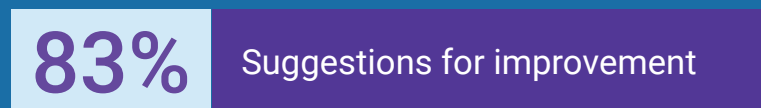
students do not use a large amount of feedback left on their work.



students encountered barriers to using and understanding feedback.

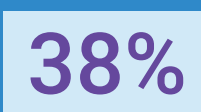
Challenge: Is it Effective?

Students report getting the most out of:

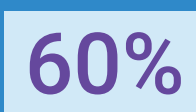


of students actually prefer feedback that challenges them to think harder about a task.

Five Tips for Fantastic Feedback



1

Connect feedback to assignment goals.



2

Give suggestions and examples.



3

Be specific and prioritize.



4

Use clear and concise language.



5

Be as timely as possible.

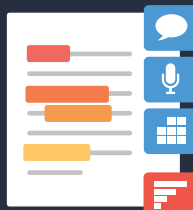
